

**Non-certified Transcript of Kronenwetter Village Board Meeting December 11, 2023 Discussion of
Nomination and Appointment of Election Inspectors for the 2024 -2025 Election Cycle.**

At times, multiple conversations occurred simultaneously, which made accurate transcription difficult. In addition, Village Board President Voll didn't control or identify who had the floor during the discussion. As a result, speakers could only be identified if I could recognize their voice and/or discern who was speaking from the video.

BOARD PRESIDENT VOLL: moving on to item 4I. Discussion action on resolution 23-16 a resolution appointing election inspectors for the 24-25 election cycle.

CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: This is the resolution that the clerk gives out every 2 year cycle. um The list is submitted by the Republican Party, Democratic party and then I am um contacted by un-Affiliates. I made this one as detailed as possible. You will see there are three election inspectors who are on the list that have called and said that either they do not wish to be on the list or they never asked to be on the list. um Their names are in the top paragraph on the second page so I um have them excluded but everybody on the lists that I was given are included on here.

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: I was contacted them we have uh emails proof straight from them that they are to not to be included in the list and one of them actually said they told the Republican party that they were not to be included and they were still put on the list.

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: okay so in order to remove them from the list um so obviously you you contacted all did you say there's four or five

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: there's three people.

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: okay because there's five people uh from the Republican list that are not included on your list on page 19. um I'm not sure who the other two are I can I can look them up but now once they're on the list um in order to take them off you have to uh

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: after they're appointed you have to contact the elections Commission after their appointment

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: so before the board appoints them you don't have to deal with the elections commission

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: correct

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: um

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: Do you have any names for me of the the folks that you said are not on my list?

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: okay and now in the past we've had um a list of Republicans Democrats and independents. Why is this list all lumped together.

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: I contacted the municipal clerks from all all around us um most of them do not put the list on there to protect the privacy of the political party of these folks so they are not

persuaded in any way. If you would like a list you can definitely shoot me an open records request and I'm more than happy to submit the list.

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: so if um okay part part of the deal here is that when you pick these people to work they um you have to pick a balance between Democrats and Republicans

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: that's correct

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: and if if there's not enough of one or the other you pick some of the independents here uh how since you don't have the list publicized how does the public know that you've got a balance because it it needs to be balanced and uh um

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: the trust in the clerk so they are balanced. The party that needed to have the more candidates have all. All the candidates that actually were submitted are on here. The party that needed the most candidates was the most submitted.

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: well okay I'm just going by the statutes here and basically the statutes say the same thing that the first choice is from the political parties second choice if we don't have enough is from the municipality and then if you don't have enough but then you take them from people outside the municipality and um but within the county and last election we we ended up with uh nine nine unapproved workers and 10 people from the Republican party that weren't called in. so those nine nine workers which you know.

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: there was no nine unapproved workers the clerk can fill the positions if they need to be filled or if they are vacant. The clerk has that choice. They were sworn in by the clerk therefore they were certified to be election inspectors by the clerk and they attended the training.

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: well we talked about this over the summer several times and I asked you where where you got that Authority from because it doesn't match with the statutes um if you're short on workers you're supposed to ask the political parties to provide the names

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: no

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: more more names

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: no

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: and well that's what it says so and

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: Allison Copli from the Wisconsin Elections also emailed you and explained to you how that all worked

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: uh who was that?

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: Allison Coply from the elections commission.

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: uh she just sent me the training manual

TRUSTEE DUMAIS: Is 32 people not enough?

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: oh yeah there's plenty here.

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: oh

CE?: so you're saying there's a balance of 16 and 16 on this

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: well there's a there's more of a balance to the uh party that ran won the last election yeah you got have more of one party

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: according to the law whoever basically won the last election say for governor president they they get one more than the other party

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: um well I not knowing who's who on here and knowing that some of these people work the last election when they should not have

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: that's not true Ken

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: well

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: it is not true

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: because I asked you all summer for those answers and I didn't get any and the last thing you sent me was a copy of of the whole chapter 17 or something it says it's in there and it's

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: you also spoke to Alison Copley from election

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: I did and all she sent me was a training manual which it's also not in there so I I've been looking I've been trying to find the justification for this and I haven't and um I I think it's going to be a problem if we approve this the way it is.

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: it's not going to be a problem.

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: I mean I like to have workers but um we have to maintain that balance I mean that's the whole idea of having these two parties to choose from because you need um basically if you got all Democrats you can't trust the election if you got all Republicans and this way if it's split they they keep an eye on each other basically and at the last election we had uh instead of um I think we had 28 workers something like that um 23 maybe um no 28 and you had five Republicans and the rest were were not so that was quite unbalanced and it kind of uh defeats the whole purpose of the two-party selection

TRUSTEE DUMAIS: so are you saying this list is not balanced is that what you're saying

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: well at this point we don't know if this list is balanced because we don't have um

TRUSTEE COYLE: well you well you have to you have to trust the Integrity of your clerk

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: Yep.

TRUSTEE COYLE: which she's telling you that the list is balanced and that if you would like to see their party affiliation through a public information request you can get that you're just not getting it tonight.

BOARD PRESIDENT VOLL: well that's the other thing too you said you had a list how come you can't take the list you have and just Mark out the ones that are on there

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: uh well I did that it.

Multiple Trustees speaking at the same time:

doesn't you come up with 17 15 I believe it's not balance is that what you're saying

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: right because last time we had one Democrat we had a whole slew of nonaffiliated we had 15 Republicans last time.

BOARD PRESIDENT VOLL: no I'm talking about the list that you were just talking about with those names you said weren't missing

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: yeah that that was the list from the Republican party of 22 people and they uh of course they they claimed all of them were willing to work now now we hear that

BOARD PRESIDENT VOLL: but did you take that did you take that list of 22 people and compare it to this list of 32 and mark off the 17 that are Republicans

TRUSTEE DUMAIS: wouldn't that be 15

Multiple Speakers: um

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: we know who well I know who the Republicans are so

BOARD PRESIDENT VOLL: there's 17 there's not 17 of them on here?

TRUSTEE DUMAIS: didn't a Democrat win last time was that Democrats have 17

Multiple Speakers: 15 of them on here right should be 17 to 15 Democrats 17 or 15 Republicans yeah

cuz the Democrats won the last election so it should be 17 Democrats and 15 Republicans correct Bobby speaking

TRUSTEE VEDVIK: is it Statewide is that what's determined or is it in the district and then which election?

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: so on this list here I can tell you that there are 18 Republicans on this list that I gave you okay and then there's Democrats and un-Affiliates and I just want to clarify something this is an email I sent last year to Allison Copley and she's from the Wisconsin elections commission. I said a question by one of our village board members has come up and I need your assistance with the answer. This is in regards to hiring poll workers. Our village appoints election inspectors for 2 year terms before December 31st of odd number years. A list of Republican party Democratic party and non-affiliate parties are given to the board for approval. What happens when I recruit for additional poll workers outside of the time frame that were not listed and approved by the board during the village board meeting as I mentioned above. Hi Bobby the clerk can appoint to fill vacancies Allison Copley, Wisconsin Elections Commission.

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: yeah we talked about that too and I asked you should I pass my questions through you to her or should I talk to her directly

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: and I said her

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: so I talk to her directly quite a bit and she kept uh deflecting the questions she never did explain how:

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: that's your opinion

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: what's that?

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: that's your opinion that she was deflecting the question

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: well when she doesn't answer questions that's deflecting so like I say if I had the answer and it was settled we wouldn't even be talking about this right now but we we did not get I did not get an answer from her um I ended up getting the training manual and the manual does not you know clarify that the clerk can just um pick people off the street basically.

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: what does?

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: okay uh where do you see that?

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: I don't have that in front of me, but

TRUSTEE DUMAIS: so we're we're voting for this this is the pool that the clerk can pick from that we're voting on and then if we don't have enough people you're saying the clerk gets people from outside of the

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: so what the clerk does is everybody that's on this list will get an email to work the election in training so they when they sign up for this list they have to um be able to do two things be available to work for every election that we have and attend the clerk's training. If any one of those two are not met um I can write to the Wisconsin elections commissions explain to them why I want this person removed a) they are telling me they're not working elections b) they're not doing their training and then the Wisconsin elections commissions removes them.

TRUSTEE DUMAIS: but I'm saying this the part where he's saying that you're picking people that because they're outside of this pool because like five of these people didn't follow the rules so you needed five new people or is what where are we getting the I don't see where you're picking people yourself

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: oh I can hire on as they go but if I don't have enough workers then I reach out

TRUSTEE DUMAIS: Oh ok

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: you know who wants to be an election inspector then I train them and then they come and work

TRUSTEE DUMAIS: so in a perfect world these 32 people would do their job

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: Yes

and then we would never even go outside of

TRUSTEE DUMAIS: these 32 okay

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: Exactly

TRUSTEE DUMAIS: that's what I was trying to make sure who why are we voting if it doesn't mean anything

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: and you don't have to have a greeter anymore because of we have Badger books

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: well that's what it means. okay. all inspectors shall be affiliated with one of the two recognized political parties which receive the largest number of votes for president uh meaning Republican and Democrat

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: uh 1730(4) B2 except as provided in paragraph c only those persons submitted by the chairman of each committee they're talking about Democrats and Republicans may act as um election officials now it says except in paragraph C so that's that's where we pick up the unaffiliated and in C it says um for so long as nominees are made available by the political parties under this section appointments may may be made only from those list of nominees submitted under the subsection so as long as you got enough people from both parties you don't pick any un-affiliated but in our case apparently we're we don't have enough from the parties so um um so after that the board uh okay basically let's see the the the board and Board of Elections shall give priority okay the president or chairperson of the municipality shall give priority to nominating qualified electors of the municipality for which no list of nominees was submitted so so when you run out of political uh people from the list I can I can say um any one of us could suggest people that we want to work you know work the polls but um the president you Chris Voll you're you're actually nominating these people to us just like you do it you know for

BOARD PRESIDENT VOLL: committees and stuff

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: right um so you give priority to nominated qualified electors from the municipality and then if you run out that uh it follows in 17.30(4) C go down a little bit says the president or chairperson may nominate qualified electors of a county within which the municipality is based. so so that's how how we that's what we're doing tonight and that is the list of of approved um board approves them and they're the ones who be who are used and the only question I have is the later if if

the clerk runs out of them and and she needs more people ideally well necessarily she would contact the the um political parties to get their list and at that point at that point I'm not sure if the board has to um approve those people before she hires them or if she can just take them right from the political parties.

TRUSTEE COYLE: I don't I don't think you're going to have enough time to do that

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: well if that's the case uh the one thing you cannot do is just go bring in other people

TRUSTEE VEDVIK: well it says on 7.30(2)(B) when a vacancy occurs in an office under the section the vacancies shall be filled by appointment of the municipal clerk unless the vacancy occurs in the position of blah blah blah blah blah there's a bunch of stipulations

Multiple People speaking: right so so there is no extra list you have to no choose from that list the list that we have here is to Affiliated people right right but if for some reason you can't you can't fill from the list due to unavailability or unwillingness that's what we're talking that you know she a short distance time out okay there's no provision for that though the provision it goes further that authorizes it

TRUSTEE VEDVIK: well that's if it's submitted let's say you're out of the names vacancies due to candidacy sickness or any other temporary cause appointment shall be temporary. Appointment effective only for the election which the temporary vacancy occurs I mean it doesn't really say right there I'm sure there's another subsection if you don't have it on the list

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: 7.30(4)b basically says the dominant parties under sub two are each responsible for submitting a list of names which they did from which all appointees to inspector positions other than appointees to inspector positions authorized under sub 1B shall be chosen. Each person submitting the name of one or more nominees shall certify on his or her list of nominations that the person has contacted each nominee whose name appears on the list and that each nominee has agreed to serve as an election official. so 4B is covered with that

TRUSTEE COYLE: so back to the original thing of these 32 names let's hope and pray that of that we will have a sufficient number available and willing to be trained but

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: and willing to work

TRUSTEE COYLE: and willing to work aah I I don't I don't see where there's an was there an issue last year that arose from this I guess that's how I'm

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: No.

TRUSTEE COYLE: confused

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: well that that's that's what I never got an answer to um

TRUSTEE COYLE: what

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: there there was about I'm going to see I'm going to have the list in front of me again uh about 20 Republicans one Democrat and about 15 unaffiliated something like that

TRUSTEE COYLE: okay

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: and we ended up using five Republicans and the rest were unaffiliated. oh no no they weren't unaffiliated um nine of them were not on the list of unaffiliated they were brought in what I call off the street okay so that's where the problem comes in they have uh if they were picked from the unaffiliated list that was approved by the board then you got no problem okay

TRUSTEE COYLE: did either political party complain about our election outcome?

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: well uh

TRUSTEE COYLE: cuz that really where a complaint comes from.

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: the original complaint I got was from a poll worker who wasn't called in and yet um um

TRUSTEE COYLE: did they reach out?

TRUSTEE VEDVIK: but this is on the list of each party there's the top two party.

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: Two years ago they were down by party right

TRUSTEE VEDVIK: but I mean for the call in on it if that makes sense so if a republican appointee like is unable they need to fill the vacancy then Bobbi's supposed to go to the Republican list to get a replacement.

TRUSTEE CHARNESKI: Right what what happen happened is after the guy called me I called Bobby and Bobby said I never heard of him he's not even on the list

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: and I was going based being a new clerk I was going based off of the email list that um was already in the system by sash

TRUSTEE COYLE: okay

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: so I just sent you know I went with her email list and I sent out hey we got this election coming up we need you to help. didn't realize that there was an actual list my bad as a clerk right

TRUSTEE COYLE: okay

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: until this was brought up by trustee Charneski

TRUSTEE COYLE: okay so this was an honest mistake last

VILLAGE CLERK BIRK-LABARGE: totally 100%
